Vitamin D: Hyped Up or Home Run for Health? Adit Ginde, MD, MPH, Assistant Professor of Surgery University of Colorado Denver School of Medicine

In a landmark paper published this year in *Annals of Internal Medicine*, Dr. Ginde's group compared blood vitamin D levels from 1988 through 1994, with data collected from 2001 through 2004. Over 32,000 participants were surveyed. This was the first evaluation of temporal trends in vitamin D status in the US population. The study found a marked decrease in blood 25(OH)D levels. *More than three out of four Americans now have vitamin D levels below what is believed to be necessary for optimal health*. During 2001 to 2004, only 23% of US adolescents and adults had serum 25(OH)D levels at the minimum level that appears necessary for general health benefits. Nearly all non-Hispanic blacks (97%) and most Mexican-Americans (90%) now have vitamin D insufficiency. Current recommendations for dosage of vitamin D supplements are inadequate to address this growing epidemic of vitamin D insufficiency. Increased intake of vitamin D (1000 IU/day or more)—particularly during the winter months and at higher latitudes—and judicious sun exposure would improve vitamin D status and likely improve the overall health of the US population. How did we get in this situation? How real is it, and how serious? Should we risk skin cancer to get more sun exposure? Come to the Café and join the discussion.
